Expectations

Good attendance and punctuality are vitally important if your child is to make the most of the educational opportunities we offer. If he/she is unwell and cannot come to school, please telephone the school before 8.30am and leave a message. Please let us know for each day they are absent, unless any isolation period has been discussed on the first day of absence.

If we have not heard from you by 9.30am we will message or call home. If no contact can be made we will make a home visit in line with our Safeguarding procedures.

Impact

All children will have days when they're not able to go to school, whether that's due to illness, holiday or a family emergency, and the occasional day off is unlikely to affect their education.

However, missing too much school can be seriously detrimental.

A child who misses school just twice per month will lose out on 18 days' education across the school year - that's nearly four weeks.

Isolation requirements

If your child has sickness or diarrhea they are required to stay at home for 48 hours from their last episode.

Any rash should be investigated to establish possibility of spread and to decide upon any isolation required, e.g. chicken pox requires to stay home until all spots are scabbed over.

COVID, current guidelines state that children who test positive, have any of the main 3 symptoms of COVID (new, persistent cough, temperature or loss of taste/smell) or signs of respiratory infection are recommended to stay at home for a minimum of 3 days, or until symptoms have passed.

Adults are the same as above but for 5 days.

Although there is no longer a legal requirement to isolate, this is to prevent spread in communities.

If your child is feeling generally under the weather, but you feel they are well enough to be in school, please send them in and we will contact you if we ever feel they need to go home or receive any medical treatment.

Facts...

Did you know that of 365 days in a year, 190 days are school days and 175 are non-school days—that is nearly half of the entire number of days in the year! As a school we expect parents to use these 175 days for your family time, and for activities such as shopping, appointments, day trips and family holidays. While we appreciate it's not always possible to take appointments on non-school days, we do ask that these are kept to a minimum.

Punctuality

Punctuality is equally important.

Letters to families who are of a concern each term.

Meet with families each term to address any concerns and offer support.

TAF/Family Link Workers.

Further Concerns go to panel where Council decide if prosecution is needed.

Government Press Release

'Missing school for just a few days a year can damage pupils' chances of gaining good GCSEs, according to a new report published by the Department for Education today (24 March 2016).
